Washington Town Park's Summer Concert Series Slated to Continue Into Second Year as Washington Cultural Council Announces 2022 Grant Recipients

The Washington Cultural Council has awarded funding to 10 diverse cultural programs slated to benefit not only the Washington town residents but also those of the neighboring communities. 2022 grant recipients are Becket Arts Center of the Hilltowns, Becket Athenaeum., WAM Theatre, Massachusetts Walking Tour Concerts, The Highway Men: Songs and Stories Presented by Matt York, and the famed "Friends of the Washington Town Park" Music in the Park Concert Series, which last year featured musical artists like Krishna Guthrie and Rev Tor. Other awards granted will benefit the members of the Washington Council on Aging as well as the students at Becket Washington Elementary.

Among the awarded programs are FREE opportunities for community engagement through local cultural attractions, like the Becket Athaneaum's museum passes program that grants access to the various world-class museums in the Berkshires; opportunities for children in the community to explore the studio arts with the assistance of IS183, Inc.; several outdoor events hosting musical entertainment of many genres, as well as, chances for expression through movement and dance. The WCC is eager to support these and others that not only enrich our community but the neighboring communities as well. With color rising in the willows, maples beginning to bud, and robins and bluebirds returning to the area, April brings hope for the season ahead and thoughts of getting outdoors more.

In that spirit, we're calling for a **Town-wide Roadside Cleanup** day on **Saturday, April 23** (the day after Earth Day). There will be an organized effort along Washington Mountain Rd, but residents should also consider connecting with neighbors and tackling a section closer to home. Keep an eye on the website for developing details.

Speaking of cleaning, our custodian Cindy Taylor has recently resigned. We thank her for her many years of service. So we are seeking a new custodian to clean the Town Hall. Details and an application are on the website at www.washington-ma.gov/job-opportunities.

The Highway crew will be tackling some tree removal this month, mostly dying ash, but also others endangering our roadways. Rather than have the logs hauled away, they want to try to make them available to residents who can use rough lengths for firewood. We still need to work out logistical details, but look for more information and a sign-up on the website after April 6.

April is also the height of fiscal budget season, in preparation for the Annual Town Meeting. Frankly, things do <u>not</u> look good. Many mandatory expenses are going up excessively. Our overall Education costs are slated to rise more than 15%! We are anticipating the need to seek a Levy Limit Override vote. If we can't raise enough revenue, we will need to make drastic cuts to services that are already suffering.

To better inform the community about the challenges we face and to get your input, the Select Board is planning to hold a **State of the Town gathering** on **Saturday, April 9, 10-noon**, at Town Hall. We intend to include a remote option via Zoom. As of this writing, details are still being worked out and more information will be available soon on the Town website. Think of it as a live version of the monthly Select Board letter, with the opportunity for some Q&A.

The Collins Center has provided their review of our Municipal Operations and Organization, including a recommendation for a part-time Town Administrator. This will also be part of the State of the Town talk. The report is publicly available on the Town website in the Select Board section.

Bids for the repaving project on lower Frost Rd and Lovers Lane Rd will be opened on April 4. Construction should begin around the end of the month and be substantially complete before Memorial Day. We will aim to post any information about traffic disruptions to the website's Town News section. Remember, you can subscribe to be notified by email when News like this is posted.

# Washington Insights

### Short-Term Rentals—Where To Begin

As spring light brightens our days, and fair-weather clouds race across the sky, our thoughts turn to the garden. We're getting the yard and house spruced up and, now that Covid restrictions are easing up, maybe even making that spare room ready for a short-term rental.

Carol Lew, writing on Town Finances (December 2021 Insights in the Tracks), pointed out that any Washington homeowner can rent out rooms—or their whole house—earning money for themselves and, through the state room tax, bringing in needed funds for the town.

You might be intrigued by the idea, but scratching your head about just where to begin. One place to start is an online vacation rental platform: The two most popular with guests and property owners are Airbnb and Vrbo, both designed to provide alternatives to hotel accommodations.

If it's that room you've been cleaning with the view of the hills, or if you have several rooms in the house you think would appeal to guests, Airbnb is a natural choice. A spare bedroom in someone's home, while it may lack the privacy of a full property rental, is great for travelers who don't mind sharing amenities in exchange for an affordable nightly rate.

Airbnb is also known to offer one-of-a-kind stays in tiny houses, yurts, castles, treehouses, even a private island; the site often attracts younger, adventure-seeking travelers, usually looking for a short stay. Airbnb also includes whole house rentals. Because of the wide variety of properties offered on their site, Airbnb typically attracts twice as many travel seekers each month as Vrbo.

While Vrbo does not list shared spaces, the platform boasts traditional family accommodations and often, but not always, large vacation homes, attracting large families and an older audience. Vrbo properties tend to be more suited to longer stays.

Airbnb has a wide range of information on its website—from videos about hosting to helpful lists that include proper cleaning tips, safety information, building rules and,

importantly, filling out your tax returns. Airbnb's online "help center" answers most questions and covers what it takes to be a responsible host. First on the list: health and cleanliness.

There are also a range of companies offering services to help coordinate your short-term rentals, from cleaning to managing your business.

One couple in our town has rented their second home in the neighborhood over the past 25 years. Now that they are permanent Washington residents, they have acquired a little house adjacent to their home as a place for their grown children to stay when they come to visit, but also, after the positive experience of renting their home, they plan to offer the space as a short-term rental.

And there are other short-term renters in our town who have been doing it for a long time. Will and Michele Beamer have been renting their timber-frame guest house on Vrbo since 2014. They also list on Airbnb. Originally designed as an office, the space grew with the addition of a kitchen, bedrooms and a beautiful cruck-frame living room. They specify no children, no pets and no smoking. The uncluttered interiors and design, along with a washer and drier, make it easy to clean, according to Michele.

Another resident, Johnny Irion, has listed his cruck-frame home on Vrbo since 2015. The whimsical interior, designed by the Master Craftsman Jack Sobon, has four bedrooms and sleeps six. Irion allows children and stipulates a minimum stay of two nights.


Down the hill from Irion is the large "Berkshire Shingle Cottage" belonging to Andy Inganni who has listed this spacious home on Vrbo since 2008. His timber-frame home has two screened porches and views of the western hills; it sleeps eight and is offered for a minimum of six days, Saturday to Friday.


