

# Open Burning for 2022

Open burning is now open and will run through May 1, 2022. Washington residents and property owners must obtain a permit for open burning from the Fire Chief for each day they want to burn. There are two options for obtaining a permit:

- Call the Fire Chief's residence (413) 623-2185 and 1. speak directly to the Chief or leave a message (listen to the entire message to be sure burning is being permitted for the day). When leaving a message include name, address where you will be burning, and a contact phone number.
- 2. Log onto www.bcburnpermits.com and follow the directions that are listed.

Weather conditions, current and predicted, are part of the determining factors for permitting. The MassDEP also makes a determination based on air quality. Call the MassDEP Air Quality Hotline at (800) 882-1497 or visit MassAir Online to find out if the daily air quality is acceptable for burning.

Open burning must be done:

- Between 10:00 AM and 4:00 PM
- At least 75 feet from all buildings
- As close as possible to the source of the materials being burned
- When air quality is acceptable for burning
- Attended by an adult until completely extinguished
- Extinguishment materials / tools must by onsite and available
- No hazardous materials
- Use common sense and be safe
- Call 911 immediately if the fire gets out of control

# 2022 Dog Licenses are Available

The 2021 licenses and tags do not expire until March 31, 2022, but you are welcome to get the 2022 license/tag anytime you would like. You can see the Town Clerk on Monday evenings with the following:

- Current rabies certificate
- Proof of spay or neuter, if applicable
- Fee: \$4.00 if spayed/neutered or \$10 if not

You can also mail the above (checks payable to Town of Washington) to the Town Clerk, 8 Summit Hill Rd, Washington, MA 01223 and a license and tag will be mailed back to you.

Please note that if you received a 2021 late fee invoice, you will have to pay that first before receiving your 2022 license/tag.

With the Omicron variant raging through Berkshire County, the Select Board had hoped to obtain Covid-19 at-home test kits for our community. But regional efforts stalled when other towns pulled back after the Federal government announced plans to distribute free kits and make insurance companies cover costs of at-home tests.

All residents are strongly encouraged to sign up for the 4 <u>free</u> test kits being offered from the U.S. government by going online to CovidTests.gov or calling 1-800-232-0233.

We are still looking into opportunities to procure N<sub>95</sub> masks for residents, depending also on State and Federal efforts and their effectiveness.

Until recently, we have seen more ice storms than snow again this winter. Dealing with icy roads is more costly than snow removal, unfortunately. Supplier problems have made it a challenge to keep up with salt needs. Ongoing mechanical problems with one of our plow trucks haven't helped. We also face serious repair needs with the Voc. Ed. school bus. The Select Board and Finance Committee will be confronting these issues further in the upcoming budget process.

We plan to go out to bid in the coming month for the repaving of Lovers Lane Rd and lower Frost Rd this spring, to be paid from our Ch. 90 funds. Also later this year, we plan to finish raising Upper Valley Rd and then repave it from Summit Hill Rd to Route 8, also with Ch. 90 funding.

At the last hearing on Bucksteep, the Receiver brought a motion to enforce their lien. The judge ordered the Owner to arrange a payment plan by Feb 28, or else he will hear the Receiver's motion to authorize them to sell the property. The Owner still claims to be intent on auctioning the property soon. The judge clarified that notice of the auction and any bid award will be subject to court approval. The case drags on. The next hearing is scheduled for March 14.

After several years of talking about it, we are pleased to finally launch a new Town website this month. Our site is now on the same CivicPlus platform used by many other towns in the region. Elsewhere in this Tracks, you'll find an orientation to some of the features. Note that with this renovation, our official town web address will now be washington-ma\_gov instead of .com.

This makeover has been funded through a Community Compact Best Practices grant in the arena of citizen engagement and represents a major effort to improve information, transparency, and access to our Town government. We also hope this will provide a useful tool for fostering a greater sense of community through frequent news & announcements and communication. The site should be live by Feb. 1, or shortly thereafter.



# A Home to Share Building rental income while sharing lives

Senior Housing– and affordable housing– are top priorities for the Town of Washington's long-term plan. And while all of us consider how that housing might be built and how we can pay for it, there's an affordable option that could be implemented right away. I learned of it through my niece Annamarie Pluhar, who began a nonprofit 4 years ago called Sharing Housing, Inc. Based in East Dummerston, Vermont, Annamarie provided some insights that could be helpful here in Washington.

In our country, and here in our community, the cost of housing and the availability of affordable housing is a pervasive problem. According to the 2020 US Census more than 30 percent of the households in the country are single occupancy, for a total of 36 million Americans living alone. And the trend is growing. The median age of our population in Washington has increased from 41 years old, as recorded in the 2000 Census, to 56.5 today. About 40% of our population is 65 and older and about 14% of them live alone.



"That's a lot of empty rooms," says Annamarie who is also the author of Sharing Housing: A Guidebook for Finding, and Keeping Good Housemates. (Bauhan Publishing, \$16.50)

Many folks love living alone. But what are your options, she asks, if you find yourself living in a house that is too big for your needs, too expensive to maintain—and you don't want to move? Or maybe you are just starting a career, you have a job, but your salary isn't big enough to afford an apartment in the community you know and love? One solution is to find a housemate—or mates—helping to conserve resources and supporting a familiar way of life.

"Like many people of my generation, I started living in shared housing after college," Annamarie explains. "I lived in rental apartments and houses with many different people. Later, I bought a house that was big enough for me to have two housemates. I liked to have someone to say hello to and I liked sharing the bills. I lived in that house for ten years and had many housemates, some for years, some for a few months. All of them started out as strangers. I made good friends and I made some mistakes, but I learned how to make it work."

Annamarie came to realize that she had acquired some very useful knowledge, and that crystalized when a good friend was having a financial crisis and did not feel she could afford living in her home. Annamarie remembers saying, "You have an asset here. You could rent a room in your house."

When her friend complained that she'd tried having a roommate and it hadn't worked, Annamarie offered to coach her on a better selection process.

"I realized over the twenty years of having housemates I had honed a model for selecting good housemates and after research I also learned that the process was nowhere documented." Then, after Annamarie began to coach people, she realized that a guidebook for selecting a housemate would help folks unsure how to proceed.

In her book, Sharing Housing, Annamarie defines a homemate as an independent person whom you like and respect and whose ways of living at home are compatible enough with yours that everyone is comfortable.

In the past, the main reason for sharing housing was the financial help it offered, but since the pandemic, when so many folks have been forced to be alone for much of the time, companionship and help with tasks are also big motivators.

"People start for the income and stay for the companionship," says Annamarie, adding "Five hundred dollars a month can make a big difference; so can the company."

When considered carefully, shared housing offers a range of benefits: additional income, social connection, extra hands, and living light on the earth. If you are interested but uncertain about how to get started, Annamarie has designed a website where you can explore articles, sign up for a newsletter, read about matching programs, find books on shared housing and even sign up for on-line workshops that make what can seem a daunting project easier.


In some communities, renting a room in your house might require a special permit, but in the Town of Washington, renting a room (or up to three rooms) in your house requires only the approval from the Board of Health.

With the need for affordable housing so ubiquitous, cutting down the number of one-person households by sharing housing is a solution that could be widely applied and, at the same time, might help diminish social isolation in our communities.



1 Town News & Calendars — You can now find timely News front & center on the home page.

The Calendars divvy up Public Meetings from Community Events, so you can more easily focus on the kinds of events you're interested in. Dates with an underline have something scheduled which you can view by hovering.

- **2 Action Center** Buttons take you right to common tasks and information. Let us know what else you want to see here.
- 3 How Do I ...? This menu also guides you to where to find things when it might not be obvious which board or department handles what you're looking for. Your feedback on this is also welcome.



- Contact Us Send a general message or direct it to a specific department or board.
- 5 Subscribe to Alerts You can sign up to receive email notices when items are posted. You can choose among News, Urgent Alerts (not shown), and specific Board/Committee Agendas & Minutes.

- 6 Useful Links In the left sidebar, you'll find links to relevant forms, downloads, resources, information, etc.
- **7** Contact Info, Hours, Meetings The kinds of information will vary by department or board.
- **8 Key Contacts, Staff & Members** In most cases, clicking on a Staff Contact or Board/Committee Member name will open a Contact form to send a message. With only a few exceptions, we aren't publishing email addresses directly on the website, especially when personal addresses are involved, in order to prevent getting on spammers' lists.
- **9 Board Calendars, Agendas & Minutes** Boards & Committees will now be required to post their agendas and minutes online (and be able to do so themselves).
