


2022 Dog Licenses Available

Just a reminder that the current (2021) dog licenses will expire March 31, 2021. The dog licenses for 2022 are now available. Please see the Town Clerk on Monday evenings with the following information or send it in the mail (Attn: Town Clerk, 8 Summit Hill Road, Washington):

- Current rabies certificate
- Proof that your dog is spayed or neutered, if applicable
- Appropriate fee. \$4 if dog is spayed or neutered, \$10 if not
- Mail the above to the Town Clerk, 8 Summit Hill Road, Washington, MA 01223 and a license and tag will be mailed to you.
- If you received a late fee invoice for 2021, you will have to pay that first before you can renew your dog for 2022.

Washington Insights

Accessory Dwelling Units

Over the past few months, Washington's Steering Committee has been focusing on one of the primary issues outlined in the Town Plan: Housing. The group is exploring a solution that many other Berkshire towns have been adopting or considering over the last several years, and that's Accessory Dwelling Units.

An Accessory Dwelling Unit is a self-contained living space that includes sleeping quarters, cooking facilities, and bathroom facilities. It can be within or attached to a primary dwelling or existing structure, or it can be an accessory structure. ADUs are not permitted in most circumstances under Washington's current bylaws, so there are a number of steps between the idea of it and the ability of residents to implement this option for themselves.

Why is the idea of adopting an ADU bylaw attractive?


- It's an avenue that could make it possible for senior residents in Washington to age in place. An accessory dwelling might allow a family member or caretaker to live with them while still maintaining an independent lifestyle.
- It's a way that residents could earn income, renting a unit to a long-term tenant or short-term vacationers.
- Accessory dwellings would increase town revenue through increased property value and, potentially, 6% room tax from short-term rentals.

Don Gagnon, co-chair of the Steering Committee and Chair of the Planning Board, is happy to have the input of the group on the topic. "The different perspectives have been both interesting and enlightening," Don says. "Our collective research has allowed the team to examine and compare our Zoning Bylaws with other towns of similar size and agricultural/residential zoning."



An ADU can take many forms. It can be a unit within a current primary dwelling or outbuilding. It can be attached to a current building, or it can be detached.

What all accessory dwellings have in common is that they are smaller than the primary dwelling. How much smaller does it have to be? That's one of many questions the committee is discussing. Another question that needs a lot of thought is whether an ADU should be allowable "by right", or if it would require a special permit. With so many different types of ADUs, the answer will likely be: A little of both. Looking at ADU bylaws other towns have passed has helped to inform the conversation.



This early-on stage of exploration is the time to form a well-thought-out proposal.

Don says, "The Committee meeting venue is providing an open forum of discussion. Members are sharing information they hear from town residents bringing other voices to the discussion." He adds, "We welcome other town residents to participate if they'd like to add their ideas to the mix."



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














For the second year in a row now, the Town Hall septic line has frozen, making the drains and toilets unusable. This time it can't be explained away as the result of being unused due to the pandemic shutdown. So, in addition to solving the immediate problem, the Board will need to have the possible causes investigated and weigh the costs of any long-term options.

The Highway Department wants to remind residents that plowing snow from driveways on to town roads is not permitted. Doing so creates a potential hazard to traffic. Please help us keep roadways as clear and safe as possible during and after snow events.

Bidding for the project to redo the paving on Lovers Lane Rd and lower Frost Rd is now open. We hope to get several competitive bids and award the contract in early April for construction in late spring or early summer, as soon as the weather permits.


Gov. Baker recently filed a Supplemental Budget bill to use surplus State revenue this year for various priorities and projects. The bill includes an earmark specifically to fund the replacement of our collapsed Frost Rd culvert. After nearly three years of unsuccessful efforts to secure various grant funding, this could finally be the break we need. It's up to the Legislature now. We have reached out to our legislators and will be monitoring progress closely.

The Select Board continues to explore the pros & cons of possibly having a part-time Town Administrator. The Collins Center for Public Management will present their evaluation and recommendations this month. At the same time, Washington has partnered with Savoy and Windsor in a grant application to research and develop a shared-service model that might make such a position financially viable for towns our size. Any final proposals will need voters' approval.

We were awarded a Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness (MVP) planning grant to identify and develop climate resiliency goals. This will lead to specific project proposals to address our community's vulnerability to the effects of increased flooding, extreme heatwaves, severe ice storms, etc., through State funding. There's a lot of State money going into this MVP program right now, and we want to gain access to the project funding opportunities. This is the first step. We will be looking for community involvement, so let Kent know if you have an interest in this.
